



Lessons from a Lobbycracy: Transformation for Transparency and Rules for Revolving Door

The Alliance for Lobbying Transparency and Ethics Regulation (ALTER-EU), the Austrian Federal Chamber of Labour (Arbeiterkammer) and the Austrian Trade Union Federation (ÖGB) host a public debate on lobbying transparency and the revolving door between public officials and private sector lobbyists in Brussels. Both of these are hot topics at the moment because the policies and instruments relating to them are under review.
